As we approach the end of the 2011-2012 school year, I think it is appropriate to remind the graduates and their parents about expectations and procedures for graduation. If your child is not yet graduating, this information may also be of benefit to you. Here are some important facts:

- 24 credits are required for graduation
- 20 hours of community service are required for graduation
- All fees must be paid prior to graduation day
- All books and materials must be returned
- All detentions assigned must be served
- Locks for lockers must be turned in
- Attendance at rehearsal is required

Rehearsal will be June 8, at 9:30 AM.

Graduation is June 9th at 2:00 PM. Students need to arrive by 1:30 PM.

A graduation checklist will be provided to seniors in their homeroom.

For those of you reading this who are parents

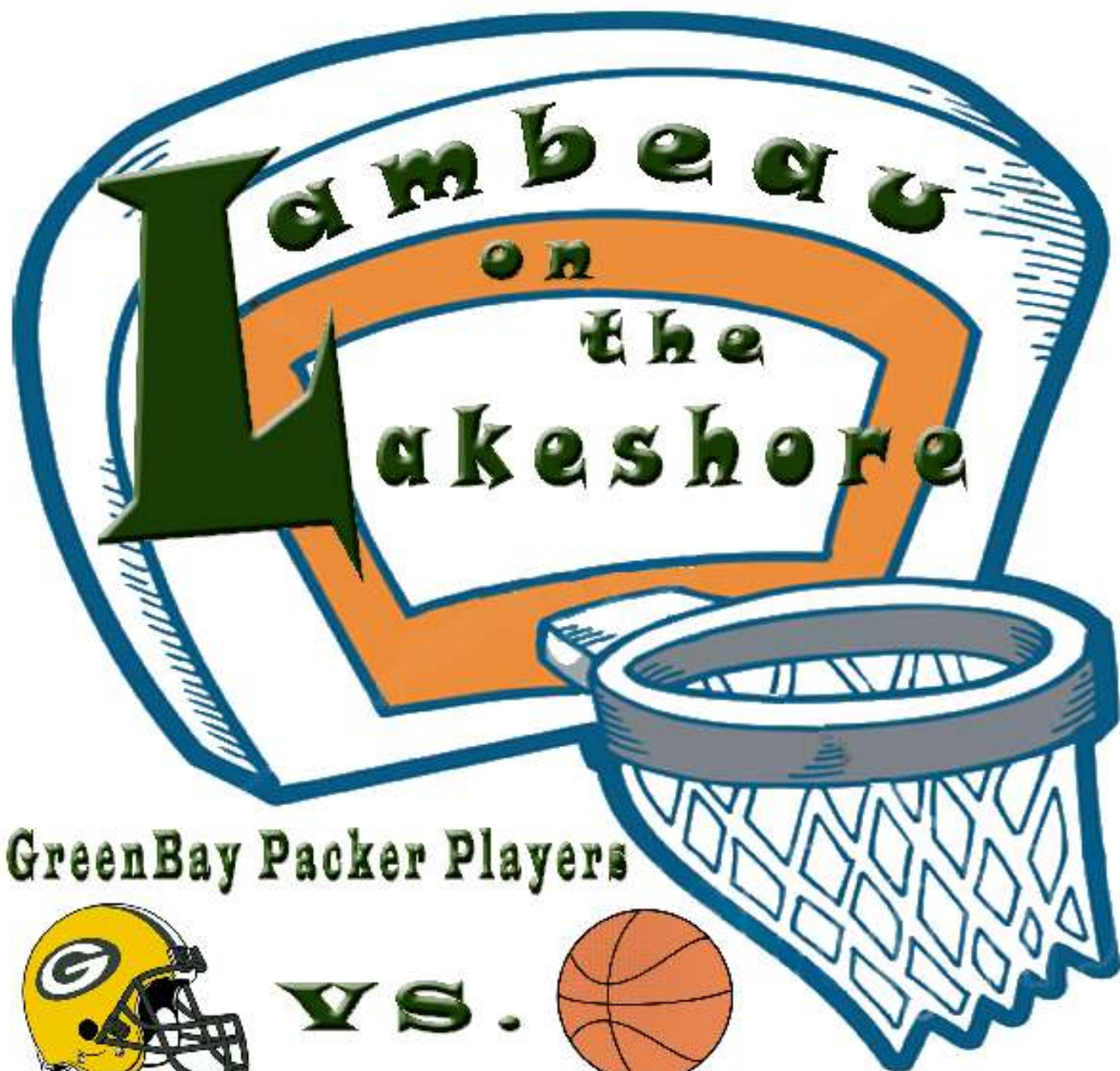
of incoming freshmen, or the graduating class of 2016, the Two Rivers School District Board of Education recently adopted a new policy requiring an additional math class for graduation. Incoming freshmen will be required to complete Algebra, Geometry, and Algebra 2. These changes are a response to changes in state testing beginning with the 2014-2015 school year.

I would also like to take this opportunity to remind students and parents about completing the 20 hours of community service. Students are given 4 years to complete this requirement, and many wait until the last minute to complete them. Please get them done early to avoid any conflict.

News from the Library Media Center



The middle school and high school years are when your child really becomes a competent reader, writer, and learner. What can you do to help your child read?

- Give your teenagers gifts of books and writing materials that interest them.
- Remind them of the importance of using libraries and the Internet to gain useful information.
- Take reading materials along when you go some where and you have to wait. (airport, doctor's office).
- Talk about books, magazine articles, and newspaper articles you both read.
- Model reading at home and in public. Let your teenagers see you reading.
- Go to the library with your teenagers.
- Communicate to your teen by talking and showing them the importance of education, and encourage him or her to share both learning successes and problems with you.
- Be active in your teenager's education and provide time and opportunities that continue learning at home.
- Find your teenager's strengths and encourage him or her to use and build on them.
- Participate in school activities, and talk to your child about them.

Making up failed credits... 24 are required to graduate.

Completing elective courses... working toward the 8 ½ credits required
